In 2008, peak industry body Clubs Queensland commissioned a Social and Economic Impact Study\* (SEIS) of the state's not-for-profit community club industry to determine the true scope and value of the contribution that Queensland clubs make to their communities each year.

The study surveyed registered and licensed clubs throughout Queensland, including sporting clubs, RSL and ex-services/memorial clubs, surf lifesaving clubs, workers', business, cultural and general community clubs, and the findings were collated by Dickson Wohlsen Strategies and BDO Kendalls.
